PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings, Fellow OPTU'ers

From time to time, I receive word of a conservation project needing volunteer help. In the past couple of months there were two such opportunities: Canyon Creek - move gravel to provide spawning grounds for brown trout; and Grapevine Creek - stock approximately 250 Gila trout. When these opportunities arise, I try to notify the membership as soon as possible in case someone wants to help out. However, Game and Fish is in charge of the schedule and, as we saw with the Grapevine Creek project, can change on a moments notice. (Grapevine was originally scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 16, then changed to Wednesday, Oct. 8, and finally changed at the last minute to Tuesday, Oct. 7.) These changes are out of our control, and are probably out of G&Fs' control as well, but I will continue to try to keep you informed of these opportunities, as well as any schedule changes.

I am told by Mike Anderson, Native Fish Coordinator for G&F, that there will be some conservation work on the West Fork of the Black River, he hopes by next spring. The work will involve installing elk/cattle exclosures and planting willows along the banks of the river in the Thompson Meadow section, with the intent of trying to lower water temperatures in sections of the river by providing more shade on the water thus making the habitat more suitable for Apache Trout. I know that for many in OPTU, the WFBR is "home water" for conservation projects, since many of you participated in the stream reconstruction and stocking efforts in





the late-1980s and early 1990s. I will do everything I can to keep you informed of this project, in particular, and hope to see many of you there when the call for volunteers is made....

Our featured speaker for the November 5th meeting will be Ben Smith, who is making his third appearance at OPTU. If you have been to one of the previous talks, you will know that Ben is a good speaker, well-informed and with a dynamite slide show. I expect this presentation will be no less. His topic will be "Pyramid Lake and Large Lahontan Cutthroat Trout on a Fly Rod". I hope to see you there.

San Juan and Lees Ferry



Lees Ferry, AZ - March 23 - 26, 2015

Once again we are very excited to announce the 2015 OPTU fishing outing will again be held at Lee's Ferry, Arizona. We had a great time at Lee's Ferry this past March.....the wild Rainbow trout were in full spawn, showing off their beautiful color and aggressively hitting our lines.

For those not familiar with this water, Lee's Ferry is a massive, clear running cold water fishery. It runs 15.5 miles from the outflow of Lake Powell at the Glen Canyon Dam to the upper end of the Grand Canyon. The scenery is breathtaking and just enhances the view while fishing. There will be two days of guided fishing provided by Lee's Ferry Anglers owned by Terry and Wendy Gunn. All guides are full time professionals....no part-time guides. They will provide the boats which will allow us to fish the entire stretch of the Colorado River in this area.

We will be staying at the Cliff Dweller's Lodge at the base of the Vermillion Cliffs. The lodge was built in the 1950's and was purchased by the Gunn's in 2001 and has since been renovated.

We estimate the cost of the trip will be \$650 per person. The following will be included in the price: three nights lodging at Cliff Dwellers; two full days of guided fly fishing on the river; tips for all guides and lunch will be provided on fishing days.

Unlike last year, OPTU will not be providing transportation. If you reserve a spot for this trip, please indicate whether you would be able to drive...this will help us organize car pooling so gas costs can be shared. Attendees will also be responsible for paying for their own breakfast and dinner which will be at Cliff Dweller's Lodge restaurant. Also, if your guide provides you with flies during guided fishing, you will be responsible to that guide for reimbursement.

Please note: spots are limited so we will reserve them on a first come, first serve basis.....you must send me an email to reserve a spot at kayceesgarden@att.net. Upon reserving your spot, a \$100 deposit will be required by our OPTU November member's meeting which will be November 5th. The balance of the payment will be due by our January 2015 meeting.

Now nearly all those I loved and did not understand when I was young are dead, but I still reach out to them. Like many fly fishermen in western Montana where the summer days are almost Arctic in length, I often do not start fishing until the cool of the evening. Then in the Arctic half-light of the canyon, all existence fades to a being with my soul and memories and the sounds of the Big Blackfoot River and a four-count rhythm and the hope that a fish will rise.

To my father, the highest commandment was to do whatever his sons wanted him to do, especially if it meant to go fishing.

One reason Paul caught more fish than anyone else was that he had his flies in the water more than anyone else. "Brother," he would say, "there are no flying fish in Montana. Out here, you can't catch fish with your flies in the air."

FISHING REPORTS

Silver Creek October 2014

Cullen and I headed up to Silver Creek on the Monday after opening. Silver Creek is just outside of Show Low in the White Mountains if you haven't been before. The ground was still a little muddy from the flood that had occurred just before the Project Healing Waters folks went up on the opener October 1. The fish were very large as usual up in the "pond" at the top and it was almost shoulder to shoulder on Monday and Tuesday. We weren't expecting that number of folks having never gone this early in the season before. Many fish over 5 lbs were landed, most by other people but we did get some nice ones too. The first afternoon Fish and Game planted 1,400 lbs of fish in the lower part of the river and they did the same the next day. I assume this planting would have been done the week earlier if the dirt paths hadn't been muck from the floods.

I tried the pond again the next day and landed a few but it was much slower than the day before by all accounts. On walking down to the lower river later in the day I found out why there weren't quite as many people up top on Tuesday - a bajillion fish were down below. I probably caught 20 or so rainbows in the two pound class and another half dozen smaller Apaches in an hour. However, it was quite crowded. For those in the know the "item" worked well in the lower and upper portion but up top in the "pond" I think the best success was on dead drifted leeches. Of course everything is dead drift up there since the "current" is about 0.001 mph, kind of like watching paint dry while you wait for a fish to find your offering. Keep changing flies until you find something that works. It could be any manner of thing.

On a sad note we saw about 8 dead rainbows of 5 lb. or greater size. Some people just don't treat the fish correctly. Saw way too many people with fish out of the water for more than a minute taking pictures. They may swim off but they aren't in good shape. My guidance has always been to run a 100 yard dash and the hold your breath. Time how long you can do it and that should be the time the fish is out of water. Sometimes it isn't easy but that should be your goal.

Since many anglers bring long nets and no waders they often also handle the fish with dry hands. That is another reason why the numbers drop off during the season I assume.

Take a trip up to Silver Creek if you haven't been. The opportunity to catch that size fish doesn't occur in many places.
