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
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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE


Greetings, Fellow OPTU'ers

On September II our Conservation Officer, Robin Marsett, received word from Don Mitchell of AZG&F the the two proposed regulation changes of particular interest to OPTU had been adopted by the G&F Commission. To recap, the two proposals were I) adopt catch and release, single barbless artificial fly or lure, fishing for Grant Creek, and 2) allow catch and release fishing, using single barbless artificial fly or lure only, for Gila Trout in Frye Creek each year between October and the following March. These regulations will take effect in January, 2015. And, speaking of Conservation, the following was received from the Zane Grey Chapter in Phoenix:



Fifteen volunteers are needed on September 27th for installation of 8 tons of spawning gravel at Canyon Creek to continue the gains made in the establishment of a successful wild brown trout fishery. Volunteers will meet on Saturday September 27th at 8:00am in the Canyon Creek Meadow parking lot to move gravel into the stream. Directions to the meadow are: Take SR 260 east from Payson to the junction with FS 512 (road to Young). Turn right and drive south on FS 512 approximately 3 miles to the Canyon Creek turnoff and turn left (east) on FS 33 and continue for 3 miles to FS 34 and proceed to the meadow.

Recommended items to bring include work gloves, shovels, buckets, protective eyewear, hats, sun screen, snacks and water. Fishing equipment is optional if you plan to spend time there after the project. All volunteers will receive a Canyon Creek Patch showing



Volunteers Needed for Gila Trout Stocking

ZGTU continues its partnership with the Arizona Game and Fish Department (AZGFD) in the Arizona Partnership Waters Program to work on the reintroduction and maintaining of Gila Trout in Grapevine Creek on the Prescott National Forest. Volunteers are needed to assist AZGFD on Thursday, October 16th, to stock 250 Gila trout in various points in the watershed.

Volunteers should plan to arrive at the Grapevine Creek area at 9 a.m. and plan to finish around midafternoon. If you are interested in participating or need additional information, please contact Mike Anderson, AZGFD Native Trout Program Coordinator at manderson@azgfd.gov or 623-236-7653. You will be added to the volunteer list and be provided updates as the project progresses.

If you are able to participate in either or both of these, please contact the individuals listed. For trip planning purposes, Canyon Creek is at least 4-5 hours from central Tucson and Grapevine Creek is about 4 hours. I am sure both of these are weather-dependent, so if you sign up make sure you will be notified of any delay or cancellation.

On a related note the Game and Fish Commission approved two actions which will have an impact on us in OPTU. They have approved designating Grant Creek on Mount Graham as a catch and release, artificial, single hook, barbless fishery starting 1 January of 2015. This is in response to a request put forward by us and the Tucson Office of the Arizona Game and Fish Department. The second change is that Frey Creek, on Mount Graham, will be open to catch and release, single hook, artificial, barbless for Gila Trout from 1 October to 30 March starting on 1 October of 2015.



PROJECT HEALING WATERS FLY FISHING



Project Healing Waters just returned from Durango, Colorado where we held Operation Wild Trout V. We had 15 veterans, a few care givers, and half a dozen helpers on this trip. San Juan and Lees Ferry



Lees Ferry, AZ - March 23 - 26, 2015

Once again we are very excited to announce the 2015 OPTU fishing outing will again be held at Lee's Ferry, Arizona. We had a great time at Lee's Ferry this past March.....the wild Rainbow trout were in full spawn, showing off their beautiful color and aggressively hitting our lines.

For those not familiar with this water, Lee's Ferry is a massive, clear running cold water fishery. It runs 15.5 miles from the outflow of Lake Powell at the Glen Canyon Dam to the upper end of the Grand Canyon. The scenery is breathtaking and just enhances the view while fishing. There will be two days of guided fishing provided by Lee's Ferry Anglers owned by Terry and Wendy Gunn. All guides are full time professionals....no part-time guides. They will provide the boats which will allow us to fish the entire stretch of the Colorado River in this area.

We will be staying at the Cliff Dweller's Lodge at the base of the Vermillion Cliffs. The lodge was built in the 1950's and was purchased by the Gunn's in 2001 and has since been renovated.

We estimate the cost of the trip will be \$650 per person. The following will be included in the price: three nights lodging at Cliff Dwellers; two full days of guided fly fishing on the river; tips for all guides and lunch will be provided on fishing days.

Unlike last year, OPTU will not be providing transportation. If you reserve a spot for this trip, please indicate whether you would be able to drive...this will help us organize car pooling so gas costs can be shared. Attendees will also be responsible for paying for their own breakfast and dinner which will be at Cliff Dweller's Lodge restaurant. Also, if your guide provides you with flies during guided fishing, you will be responsible to that guide for reimbursement.

Please note: spots are limited so we will reserve them on a first come, first serve basis......you must send me an email to reserve a spot at kayceesgarden@att.net. Upon reserving your spot, a \$100 deposit will be required by our OPTU November member's meeting which will be November 5th. The balance of the payment will be due by our January 2015 meeting.

QUOTES AND JOKES

Absent a jury of our peers, too many non-fishermen believe anglers actually make conscious choices about when they should be somewhere. This is because people who don't fish don't understand "fishing-time."

Fishing-time is not like normal time. In normal time, people are in charge. In fishing-time, fish are. This is where the trouble begins. To a fisherman, a hot bite is like a black hole somewhere in deep space. Time as we know it ceases in black holes. If you see a fisherman cast, look at his watch, cast, look at his watch, land a fish, look at his watch, cast and look at his watch, you can pretty much figure he's got either a date in court or a bad marriage.

FISHING REPORTS

Alaska September 2014

The "Murphy Group" headed to the Great Alaska Lodge in Sterling, AK on the Kenai Peninsula for our 14th annual trip. Four Tucsonans (Murphy, Hanks, Hanks, and Malone) were met by repeat visitor friends from Texas (Houston and Austin), Arkansas, and Wisconsin. The Hanks' and I focused on steelhead for three days but the luck was only fair. Each steelhead hooked was a prize and we enjoyed our efforts. Much of the group focused relatively heavily on bringing home silver salmon and generally had their limit each day. The last day the salmon crew limited by 9 am and then caught and released another dozen or so apiece. Poundage was reportedly quite high that day.

The other focus of the trip was on rainbows and dolly varden on the upper and middle portions of the Kenai River. The upper, as usual, yielded the high volume with dozens of good size caught by everyone each day. The middle holds the biggest fish and I managed to land a nice one of 29" x 17." By the various formulas that is somewhere around an 11 to 12 lb trout. Not bad at all. I still haven't been able to match my 34" x 20.5" and 32" x 21" rainbows from 2004. Still trying though.

As for wildlife, only one bear was sighted this year along with several moose, some loons, and many of the famed Alaska pigeons - Bald Eagles.

If you haven't had the chance to experience Alaska fishing and sightseeing don't let the opportunity pass you by. Fishing pressure will only continue to grow and the wilderness experiences diminish. It is a special place and the trout there are as big or bigger than anywhere in the world (and generally a lot closer and less expensive to get to).
