PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings, Fellow OPTU'ers

As of this writing, there are fewer than 50 days until the 1st of October. YAAAAY!!

It has been a somewhat long and steamy summer. I hope you were able to escape for a while to more friendly temperatures. And, I hope you were able to take advantage of some of the information provided by some of our monthly speakers: Jack Houck (Mogollon Rim lakes), Duane Redford (Eagle River, Colorado), Mike Kaul (Wind River Range in Wyoming), and Cinda Howad (White Mountains of eastern Arizona) all gave great talks and provided specific information about where to go, flies to use, and techniques for maximizing your chances to have a banner day on the water. I hope you took notes...

At the end of my September Presidents Address last year, I announced that Clay Evitts had passed away in July (2014). Clay was among the original members when the Chapter was chartered in 1987, frequently participated in the West Fork of the Black stream restoration work, and was also a frequent instructor at the monthly Lie 'n Tie meetings. In January of this year, I was notified by Chris Wood, TU President and CEO, that OPTU was the beneficiary of a sizeable bequest from Clay's estate. The other half of Clay's estate was bequeathed to The Nature Conservancy. The terms of Clay's will did not specify how – or how not – the money was to be used. Given that Clay left a large amount of his estate to two conservation-oriented organizations, the Board and Officers have





decided that the money we receive will benefit conservation programs in Arizona; we will not use the money for the day-to-day operation of the Chapter. We will still hold fund-raising raffles and have a fund-raising banquet every other year to generate funds for those expenses. We hope that you will continue to be generous in your support of OPTU.

Our September meeting will be held on Wednesday, September 2, at the Viscount Suite Hotel on Broadway at Arcadia, starting at 7:00 p.m. The featured speaker is Charlie Palmer. Charlie has been fly-fishing for over 30 years. He is an Arizona-licensed Guide who lives in Vail. Charlie also sells Cortland products and flies through his online store. He owns two vacation rental cabins, one near Payson right across the road from the East Fork of the Verde River, and the other near Nelson Reservoir in the eastern White Mountains. CONSERVATION

The OPTU Conservation program continues to be active. We are now participating in the Arizona Game and Fish Department's Partnership Waters Program. We have adopted several streams in the Pinaleno and Chiricahua Mountains. These streams include but are not limited to Frey Creek, Ash Creek, Grant Creek, Post Creek and, Marijilda Creek on Mt Graham and; Rucker Creek and, Cave Creek in the Chiricahuas. So far our efforts have yielded a change in fishing regulations on Grant Creek changing from six fish a day creel count to catch and release only. Grant Creek is an Apache Trout fishery with a self-sustain population of wild trout . We have placed the signs with the new regulations at Grant Creek. Part of our Partnership Waters efforts will be emplacing temperature monitors in various streams throughout the area in an effort to study existing successful trout streams and to identify potential new trout streams. We will begin this process in the fall. If you wish to participate in the temperature data logger placement please contact me at marsett@comcast.net. TROUT IN THE CLASSROOM

I am happy to announce that two new schools have joined the Trout in the Classroom program in Tucson. In addition to the Ag Sciences School at Flowing Wells, we are adding Agua Caliente Elementary (a 4th grade class) and Santa Rita High School (sophomores, juniors, and seniors). They are among 13 new TIC programs statewide. Carlton Buscemi, Hector Ponce de Leon, and I will be the TU coordinators with the TIC teachers. Joe Fagan, who has been the coordinator for quite a number of years, will not be involved with TIC full-time as an instructor going forward. Joe is "retiring" from that role, but he will be available for consultation as needed, and I expect we will take him up on that offer.

A grant application for the purchase of TIC classroom equipment (tank, chiller, filter, etc) has been filed with the Arizona Sportsmen for Wildlife Conservation. If the grant is approved, equipment will be purchased for all 13 new programs, delivered, and set up. Delivery of eyed trout eggs is expected in early September, and away we go! As always, if you have any interest in participating with this very worthwhile program, please give me a call.

Incidentally, the money granted by the ASFWC group comes from the "Conserving Wildlife" license plate program. There is a \$25/year up charge (an addition to your regular license plate fee) for this special plate, but \$17 of that \$25 comes right back to all manner of conservation-oriented groups in the form of grant money. If our grant application is approved, the cost of the TIC equipment for the 13 new schools, more that \$15,000 in all, will be provided by the ASFWC and the "Conservation Plate" program and not by the TU chapters. Upcoming Fishing Trips and Outings Reports

Utah - 2015 - Fishing Report

Danny and Sharon Hooper joined the Murphy's at their place in Utah for a relaxing week of sightseeing and some fishing. Danny and John started at the Strawberry River tailwater, a crystal clear stream where sight fishing can be quite good under the right conditions. The trout species are primarily brownies with a few brookies thrown in for good measure. We both managed a few fish even though a bright day kept some of the fish a bit wary. We next hit the Provo River in the lower portion, which was running higher than usual (limited luck) and then on to the middle portion where we had a couple of fine days landing 10 to 14 inch brown trout. I had traditionally used size 18 to 20 pheasant tails and similar in these portions of the river, but the action turned out to be best with San Juan type midges (22 to 24), with blondes leading darker colors.

The fly shops all suggest sow bugs as a top pattern for both the lower and middle Provo and I have a pile in my box, but had not caught more than two trout on them over the past 5 years. During the week I jested at two different fly shops that those flies really don't work. Of course as soon as I started saying something like that, the world changed. On my last day of fishing on a fine rainy morning, I finally caught almost all of the fish on a small sow bug (18 to 20). Go figure.

I won't talk about all the fun sightseeing since this is a fishing newsletter. Suffice it to say, we had a nice time. *The editor.*
